# From the Principal

One of my highlights this fortnight was watching one of our brand-new Reception children display such independence and confidence. With a cheerful goodbye to dad in the courtyard, they skipped off to the playground without a second glance, while it was dad who needed a little comforting that morning!

#### **Parent Information Evening**

A big thank you to those who were able to attend our recent Parent Information Evening. It was a fantastic opportunity for our class teachers to share key information about classroom setups, routines, and the exciting learning ahead for this year. For those who couldn't make it, we have created a handout of the information, which will be emailed to you.

#### Safe and Inclusive School

As discussed during the Parent Information Evening, at St Brigid's, we are deeply committed to maintaining a safe and inclusive school environment. We have reviewed both our Positive Relationships and Anti-Bullying policies. In line with this, we will be sharing regular updates with students and parents on fostering positive relationships and addressing bullying.

One important reminder: our school policy is that parents should not enter classrooms after 9:00 am and before 3:00 pm. Unfortunately, we've noticed that some parents are still walking through the office space to classrooms up to 9:30 am or 'popping in' before 3:00 pm. This poses a duty of care concern, and to help us keep all students and staff safe, we will be placing signage in the front office to remind everyone of this policy. At the end of the day, gates open at 2:50 pm, and parents are welcome in the school yard. However, we ask that you please refrain from entering the classrooms. If you need to take your child out of class before the school day ends, you must sign them out at the front office, and they will be called over to meet you.

Thank you for your cooperation and continued support in helping ensure St Brigid's remains a safe and inclusive space for all.

### **Annual General Meeting (AGM)**

I am excited to invite all parents to our St Brigid's School AGM on Thursday, March 20, 2025. This is a fantastic opportunity to connect with others, engage in meaningful discussions, and learn about what's planned for the year ahead. It will also be the first chance to contribute your ideas toward shaping our strategic plan (2026-2028), which we'll be developing later this year.

Doors will open at 6:30 pm for nibbles and conversation, with the AGM beginning at 7:00 pm. As two of our School Board members will be departing, this is also an opportunity for you to get involved and join the Board. More information will follow soon.

If you can't make these sessions, volunteer packs are available at the front desk, and we're happy to assist you in completing the process.

We are delighted to welcome back our youngest members, the Flourishing Hearts children. Due to the ongoing renovation project, Flourishing Hearts will take place in the Community Hub/OSHC space for this term (and possibly Term 2 as well). #### **NAPLAN**

We are approaching an important time of the year for our Year 3 and Year 5 students as they prepare for the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). This year, the NAPLAN tests will be conducted betweenâ€⁻12th and 24th of March.

To help our students feel confident and prepared, we will be holding NAPLAN practice tests onâ€⁻Tuesday, 25th February. These practice sessions are designed to familiarise students with the test format and types of questions they will encounter, ensuring they are well-prepared for the actual assessments. They will be asked questions on reading, spelling, grammar and punctuation and numeracy.

We encourage all parents to support their children during this period by ensuring they have a good night's sleep, a healthy breakfast, and a positive mindset on test days. If you have any questions or need further information, please do not hesitate to contact the school office.

### Sacramental Programme

### Children's Liturgy

St Brigid's Church in Kilburn, offer Children's Liturgy of the Word during the 9:00 AM Sunday Mass an is organised by staff members of St Brigid's School. This program provides children with an age-appropriate understanding of the day's Gospel and helps them appreciate the structure and richness of the Liturgy of the Word.

### Shrove Tuesday/ Pancake Day -

Shrove Tuesday (Tuesday 4th March) is the day before Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of the season of Lent. The name comes from the old word 'shrive,' which means to confess. Traditionally Christians would go to church on Shrove Tuesday to confess their sins in preparation for Lent, and they would also use up indulgent foods such as milk, eggs and butter. This is why we celebrate with pancakes on Shrove Tuesday.

#### Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent, the time in the Catholic calendar of repentance as we pray, fast and give Alms in the lead-up to Easter. Our year 3-6 students will attend Mass for Ash Wednesday and the R-2 students will have a liturgy here at school. During the Ash Wednesday Mass or Liturgy students will be invited to receive our Ashes as a symbol of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross.
